### TE AO MAORI @ LSS

Kohā

Put simply, kohā is a Māori term for a gift. It's a way in which one can express gratitude in the form of a physical gift, like money, food, and bottles of fancy wine; or something intangible, like some great advice. But if you stop at a simple definition then you miss out on all the



colour and meaning of the tradition of giving a kohā. For the uninitiated, let's take an imaginary trip back in time and explore a cultural definition. Imagine your village is hosting a great celebration and guests from all across the land are welcomed onto your marae. Towards the conclusion of the welcoming ceremony, a gift of food - lets say, a few sizable baskets of kumara is offered to the hosts on behalf of the guests. On a practical level, this kohā is a contribution towards the catering for the event. On a deeper, and somewhat more personal level, kohā can also symbolise an expression of deep gratitude and affection.

In 2009, Tungia Symonds-Kaihau of Tainui and Ngāti Maniapoto, introduced a unique kōrero around the notion of koha. She suggested a macron over the 'a' be added to place emphasis to the second syllable hā (exhaled breath as in life). In this context, the word kohā broadly translates to 'it is life'. The gesture and notion of kohā in generosity is therefore limitless but could be instrumental in broadly acknowledging the celebration of life, be that directly or indirectly.

In week 6, we will be visiting the local Mana Whenua marae, Kai Iwi Pā, more commonly known as Kauwhata Marae.

All students will spend a day at the marae and our senior students will stay for one night each. We have requested that all children offer a gold coin kohā as a gift of goodwill to recognise the generosity of the tangata whenua, Ngāti Kauwhata. Last year we had planned this visit, but the marae was devastated by a flash flood that seriously damaged some of the buildings and surrounding property. Prior to the flood, some whānau had sent kohā in with their children. That was put alongside a kohā given on behalf of the school whānau to support with the rebuild and remediation work carried out. If you sent a kohā with your child last year, please do not feel obliged to offer another kohā this year. In the next newsletter we will be sharing more information and details about this upcoming visit.

# **SCHOOL BUILDING**

As you may be aware the school has a number of building alterations taking place. The old dental clinic has been modernised and will become the offices for our Learning Support Coordinators. They are due to move in tomorrow. In addition, there are two main projects in the pipeline - the modernisation of Rooms 12-15 and height modifications and enhancements to the school boundary fencing. You will also see a number of aluminium doors going in to replace existing wooden ones to increase their durability and practicality.
