### WELCOME

### YEAR 5/6 LEADERSHIP

2024 marks an exciting time for student leadership at Lytton Street School. We aim to provide as many students as we can with opportunities to take on leadership roles and responsibilities across the school. This year there will be two leadership groups: LSS Student Leaders and Te Raukura.

LSS Student Leaders is a group for both Year 5 and 6 students. Students opt into this group and take on leadership roles such as recycling, bike monitors, lunch monitors, PE shed monitors, athletics and swimming monitors, and many more. A large part of this role is going to be organising and running lunchtime clubs across the school for other students to enjoy.

Te Raukura is a leadership group for Year 6 students only. All students who are selected for this group will complete The William Pike Challenge. The William Pike Challenge is a structured, specialist Education Outside the

Classroom (EOTC), project-based and service learning programme wrapped into one. This initiative prepares students to overcome challenges and achieve their personal best in three key areas: outdoor activities, community service and passion projects. These experiences set up a foundation for exponential growth in a child in terms of mindset, resilience, confidence and adaptability. Due to the nature of this programme, this group will be capped at 30 students.

We are very excited about the leadership opportunities that are on offer for our senior students this year.

### **BY-ELECTION FOR BOARD MEMBERS**



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### **TE AO MAORI @ LSS**

Last Monday morning saw the start of a truly amazing opportunity for LSS as the whole school ventured to Kauwhata Marae. Te Manawanui were formally welcomed as the face of LSS onto Kauwhata Marae by Matua Manga & Whaea Ari. Ngāti Kauwhata remarked

how excited they were to have the marae full of life. Often marae are associated with sadness and mourning, so to hold a week-long kaupapa ora (an event full of life) is always something to celebrate. Each day, tamariki were engaged in a range of activities and tasks that created connections, while building an understanding of the function of the marae, and its people. At the conclusion of each day, the senior classes prepared for their evening sleepover. This gave them a chance to practise the skills essential to life at the marae; making beds, keeping shoes tidy at the porchway, and dishes! As the Kaitīaki or caretakers of the marae, we held the responsibility of welcoming arriving whanau each day, and also a whanau who unexpectedly arrived to visit their own marae, after a period of living in Australia. Prior to the departure of classes each day, a reflection time was held and all tamariki and adults were invited to share a word or statement about their time at the marae. A huge congratulations to all tamariki and staff, and a thank you to all parents and whanau who attended to support our kura. Last but not least, to Ngāti Kauwhata for their ongoing support of LSS, and the provision of their sacred space where we all felt welcomed, at peace and well cared for. Rirerire hau. Paimaarire.
