TRAUMA

Trauma can significantly impact a child's brain development, leading to neurodiversity. When a child experiences trauma, their brain may adapt in ways that affect their emotions, behaviour, and learning. This adaptation can result in heightened sensitivity, difficulty concentrating, or emotional regulation challenges. Supporting neurodiverse children begins with understanding and empathy. Recognise that their reactions and behaviours are often rooted in their trauma experiences. Provide a stable, predictable environment to help them feel safe. Use clear and consistent communication, and be patient with their progress.

Encourage their strengths and interests to build confidence and resilience. Collaboration with teachers and mental health professionals can ensure they receive the support they need. By fostering a supportive and understanding community, we can help our children thrive despite the challenges they face. At LSS it is always our aim to nurture and support our tamariki who have encountered trauma.

TE AO MAORI @ LSS

The sixth star is Waitā (twin of Waitī) which is associated with the ocean and represents food gathered from the sea. This star is also significant for its influences over tides and floodwaters.
