MATARIKI DISCO

Year 3 can choose the disco they wish to attend, but not go to both. The disco has a Matariki theme so you all have a licence to reach for the stars with your awesome outfits.









MATARIKI MĀ PUANGA

As the winter skies darken, the rising of Matariki and Puanga marks the beginning of Te Mātahi o te Tau – the Māori New Year. Matariki is a star cluster which appears in the middle of winter and signals the beginning of Te Mātahi o te Tau | The Māori New Year. This is a sacred and special time for whānau and hapori to reflect on the year that has been, and remember and honour loved ones who have passed and celebrate new beginnings with hope and intention for the year ahead. For many iwi across the motu, Matariki is the signal to pause, reconnect and realign with the rhythms of te taiao. Tūpuna would observe the stars to guide planting, harvesting and



preserving kai. The disappearance of Matariki signalled it was time to store crops for winter and its reappearance in Pipiri (June/July) was used to forecast the season to come.

In some places like the West Coast, the Far North and Te Wai Pounamu, Puanga (also known as Rigel) is the leading star that marks the beginning of the New Year, often rising slightly earlier than Matariki. Whether you observe Matariki, Puanga or both, this season is a time for wānanga, whanaungatanga and wairuatanga. A time to reset, give thanks and look forward with renewed purpose.

AN EVENING OF WEAVING

Last night Te Manawanui Ki Te Reo came together to celebrate Matariki with a harakeke workshop. Over 80 whānau

came along with their tamariki to learn how to weave flax into wonderful Matariki stars. A huge thank you to Whaea Lyneece, Whaea Anna and Whaea Sarah and our terrific Te Manawanui kids and staff for putting this event together. The evening finished with our tamariki performing Toia Mai and we shared some delicious kai. A big thank you to Whaea Lyneece for being our weaver and the whānau who came and celebrated with us.

Our Matariki breakfast kicked off this morning at 6.45am. It was terrific to see so many whānau pop in for kai and celebrate Matariki. A huge thank you to our staff who had a really early start and made this possible.
