

### **HERO - STUDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM**

This week we are looking at the achievement tracking graph. This graph is updated in the middle of the year and the end of the year only. The black dot shows where your child sits within the curriculum. The example included has had any names removed as your child's name would appear on this. As your child progresses at school, this dot will turn into a line with steps showing your child's achievement twice yearly.

A parent meeting, regarding HERO will be held on the 11th September - information to come out soon.

Disclaimer: It is important to note that the Ministry of Education is currently reviewing how these expectations are phrased and what the achievement steps look like. It could mean that both the graph and curriculum achievement expectations change for 2026. See graph to the right.







#### 125TH CELEBRATION - TALES FROM THE ARCHIVES

Mr H. C. Stewart was the headmaster for much of the 1910s. M.C. Amadio remembers him as being a much feared but greatly respected man. The kids generally referred to him as 'Old Stewart'. He used to tell the kids stories about the glories of the British Empire. In those days no teacher owned a motor car and there were only a dozen cars in the whole district. Most pupils walked to school from several miles away, a few had bicycles and some rode horses. It was an amazing sight as the horses usually shared the school playground with all the kids.
