## TE AO MĀORI @ LYTTON STREET

Mihi Whakatau Process - Here at LSS, we begin each term with either a pōwhiri, or a mihi whakatau. The main difference between a pōwhiri and a mihi whakatau is that while a pōwhiri may be conducted on a Marae, a mihi whakatau can be done in other locations and may not feature a karanga (the call of the woman). In this case the mihi whakatau is still an official welcome for all new students and whānau to LSS. It removes the tapu (restrictions) of the manuhiri (visitors) to make them one with the tangata whenua (hosts). This week we will be holding a mihi whakatau in the school hall to welcome new staff, students and whānau to our kura.

#### Mihi whakatau procedure

- Karanga (if being provided)
- All guests will be guided to their seats
- A karakia/blessing is then recited followed by a mihi/ speech by the hosts
- When host speeches are completed manuhiri/visitors will be invited to speak
- All speeches are followed by a waiata tautoko/song of support
- Tangata whenua will then complete the process and invite manuhiri to move across to harirū/shake hands and hongi/press noses with tangata whenua/hosts. (Sometimes, depending on Covid alert levels this may be a friendly elbow bump)

### **TE MĀTAIAHO**

Te Mātaiaho was the focus of our Teacher Only Day held on Monday. It is a refresh of the current New Zealand Curriculum. It is organised around the same eight learning areas and key competencies from the 2007 version. Mātauranga Māori sits at the heart of the learning areas - with key competencies, literacy, and numeracy explicitly woven into each learning area. Te Mātaiaho introduces a progression-focused curriculum - where Phases of learning are designed to be cumulative and increasingly complex. They are signposts that guide the learning pathway for ākonga. Picture Te Mātaiaho as a pathway through a whole school journey for students. Along the way ākonga, kaiako and whānau are guided with signposts, not lines in the sand - these being the

Phases of Learning. Ākonga will develop and acquire learning over time and through rich, responsive learning opportunities. Our staff are currently working on how our school and local curriculum will integrate and merge with Te Mātaiaho. I will aim to keep you all informed as our mahi continues.

## WHOLE SCHOOL FIRST AID SESSIONS

We are excited to have the ASB St John in Schools programme delivered to us next week which will see each class receive a lesson specifically designed for their age group. Their aim is to develop confident young kids who care for the health and wellbeing of their communities. Sessions deliver positive learning experiences where students will learn how to prevent injuries, apply first aid, and respond to emergencies.
