Te Rerenga Kōtare is the name gifted to our Kapa Haka group in 2021. We are truly grateful to Matua Rārite and Ngāti Kauwhata for such a huge honour. Kōtare is the name of the father of Kauwhata, the tupuna of Ngāti Kauwhata. The Kōtare bird itself is a very special bird, especially for this area. It lives in the trees around local rivers

such as the Oroua and its behaviour is very similar to that of a child in which it watches others and mimics the behaviour of others.

To be a part of Te Rerenga Kōtare, our tamariki are expected to display a set of values that reflect the honour and prestige that comes with this. Te Rerenga Kōtare members are to be role models for others through their actions in class, out in the playground and most importantly, when out in public. Throughout the year, Te Rerenga Kōtare display these values in a variety of settings.
